Large boxes are already in place outside the sanctuary, to receive your donations of hygiene items, small garments like socks and mittens, and individually packaged snacks.

Donations of U.S. currency will also be accepted, so that we might purchase things to fill those bags in good time to distribute them to those who most need them.

As the calendar rolls over and we begin the arduous process of learning to write 2026 instead of 2025, my mind is turning over some New Year's "revolutions." Not resolutions; revolutions.

The word *revolution* is, in its way, a *contranym*: a word that can mean two opposite things. A revolution can be the same old thing coming around again and again, like January after every December. Or, it can be the very moment when it all changes, when the world will never be the same.

Looking back over the past year, I see both meanings in our congregation's life. In some ways, we are still navigating challenges we faced last January.

I profoundly wish things had worked out with our first daycare renter, but it wasn't meant to be. Since then, we have been actively working to rent out our education building's daycare space to a different ministry partner.

In the next few weeks, you'll see a new construction project starting on that building. To include infants and toddlers, we are now required to install exterior exits for two classrooms. Once that work is complete, our new renter will move quickly to apply for all the necessary licenses. I am cautiously optimistic a new center might open this spring.

Last January, we were just beginning to explore partnering with Volunteers of America to build a senior living community on our campus. We spent the year studying similar projects, listening to you, and discerning whether this was the right choice for our congregation.

Last month, Session voted to move forward. We are signing a Memorandum

of Understanding with them, as a long process of due diligence and partnership begins.

This will be the biggest project our church has undertaken in our lifetimes. It will revolutionize the way we do ministry on our campus — but it will take several more Januaries to see it completed.

We begin this January much as we have in other years: wondering how we will meet budget. Since I started at Alamance almost nine years ago, we have lived on some extraordinary generosity, the accumulated resources of the past, and a string of what I would describe as serendipitous miracles.

It's possible we could continue that way, but your leadership knows better than to count on it. This year, we are empowered to do things differently. We believe 2026 will be pivotal for Alamance. We believe it can be a revolutionary year.

Friends, I do not say this to sound an alarm. Quite the opposite! As I continue to say, "The sky is not falling for Alamance; it's the ground beneath us that has shifted." In such a landscape, it can be hard to get our bearings and find our footing. On the other hand, that kind of tilled soil is ripe for planting.

We are as willing as we have been in quite some time to try something new, something bold. Some 250 years after the settlers of this community came together and talked about freedom and revolt from the crown's tyranny, we are considering our own revolutionary ideas. The Log College last fall was one such experiment, and there will be more.

Let me be clear: Our cause is *not* Alamance Church itself. Our cause is the Kingdom of Heaven, the reign of Christ, and the part our community plays in it.

We are a Presbyterian church. There’s an old Presbyterian motto: *Reformata et Reformanda est*. It means that we are Reformed — and continuing to be re-formed.

We are not meant to be monolithic, unchanging. The world is always changing; as we are called to respond, to adapt, and to follow the Spirit’s lead: the Spirit who makes all things new.

So, Alamance, are you ready for a revolution? A Reformation? Ready or not ...



Newsletter Policy

The Session of Alamance Presbyterian Church adopted a formal policy for *The Relay*, at its stated meeting on September 22, 2019. Policy points are based on an article in the April 2004 issue of *The Newsletter Newsletter*.

Editorial policy of *The Relay*

Our newsletter:

- Will always seek to reflect the spirit of Christ.
- Will seek to portray the congregation in a positive light, without exaggeration.
- Will not report matters that would expose members to ridicule or embarrassment.
- Will not fuel controversies. However, when controversial issues must be reported, the newsletter will report both sides in an unbiased manner.

- Will not include opinions in *news* articles. Opinions will be reserved for articles clearly identified as *opinion* pieces: the pastor's column, letters to the editor, open letters to the congregation, etc.
- Will not print material deemed inappropriate by the editor or pastoral staff.
- Will always strive for accuracy. When appropriate and useful to readers, errors will be acknowledged and corrected as soon as possible. A respectful hearing will be given to anyone bringing errors to the staff's attention. Extra effort will be used to verify the accuracy of all information, especially about individuals.
- Will not publish copyrighted material without the permission of the copyright holder.
- Reserves the right to edit any submitted material for length, style, and content.
- Will not accept submissions after the stated due date.
- Will not use language that is derogatory toward any person or group on the basis of appearance, gender, race, religion, political affiliation, or national origin.
- Will follow the strictures of the HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996), a United States legislation that provides data privacy and security provisions for safeguarding medical information.

Knit, Pray, Love (the Alamance Presbyterian knitting ministry) recently celebrated its 20th anniversary. The late Barbara Carter and Catherine Allred began a prayer shawl ministry in September, 2005.

The ministry was born out of tremendous grief at the unexpected death of their friend, Tookie Starr. Barbara and Catherine were inspired by the lovely prayer shawl Tookie received during her time in hospital.

Since then, thousands of people have been blessed by the many items donated by the Knit, Pray, Love team. There are currently about a dozen members of that ministry team. Some of them are regulars. (Some of them are decidedly irregular. See the next column for proof.)

Knit, Pray, Love Ministry

A chance encounter between a Cone Health nurse and an APC member led to KPL's extension of its ministry beyond just prayer shawls.

Forced to seek shelter from a sudden storm, two people headed into a downtown Greensboro business. One was the Cone Health nurse. The other was that APC member. When the nurse observed the church member industriously knitting through the storm, she revealed the need for holiday baby caps for newborns at Cone's Women's & Children's Center.

The church member — who was busy counting stitches at the time — somewhat absent-mindedly wrote down the nurse's contact info; and


later passed it along to the earnest needleworkers of KPL.





Here is how the Presbyterian Church (USA) government is organized:


1. Individual congregations elect Ruling Elders, who work together as a Session to conduct the business of that church.
2. Any number of congregations is organized into the next level of government, the Presbytery. This is usually — but not always — on a geographical basis. APC belongs to Salem Presbytery.
3. Several presbyteries are grouped together into the next level of oversight, the Synod. The Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina was formally organized in 1813 at Alamance Presbyterian Church. That synod was absorbed into the current Synod of the Mid-Atlantic, sometime after 1973.
4. The highest level of government is the General Assembly, which meets every two years. Its offices are located in Louisville, KY. Find out more at www.pcusa.org

2. **Before you can access the live streaming service**, you must open an account with Vimeo, either with your e-mail or your Facebook account.




The Nativity in the Narthex

The large Holy Family figures in the narthex first adorned the display window of downtown Greensboro's Belk department store, in the mid 1950s. When the store decided to retire the nativity set, Alamance church member Bill McDowell (Display Manager at that Belk location) donated the set to the church.

The plaster of paris figures were formed with molds imported directly from Germany. After 20-25 years of use at APC, the figures began to deteriorate. They were "banished" to a damp basement closet, where they crumbled even further.

In 1992, church member Bill Early patched and remolded the figures. The remaining pieces were repainted by Cathy Early, Lou Gonzalez, Edna May, and Grace Stewart Dagenhart.
