# **Keep the Light On**

Alamance Presbyterian Church 2026 Stewardship Campaign

Over the first weekend in November, I found myself at Kirby & Cheryl Ward's beautiful home in Ocean Isle — with nine high schoolers and three fellow chaperones — for the annual High School Beach Retreat.

This year, our time away for rest and renewal was also marked by the seasonal shift from fall to winter, known as the end of Daylight Saving Time. As the group and I noted the impending darkness, we reflected together on how the Church has encouraged the light of our faith; not only over the past year, but throughout our lives.

We made time to remember who has shared that light with us, how it's made a difference, and where we also feel called to share Christ's light with the world.

Jesus tells us in *Matthew 5:16*, "Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven." These words remind us that our lives — our time, our gifts, our resources — are not meant to be hidden, but shared, so that God's love can be seen through us.

We call this season of sharing "stewardship." This year we invite everyone to explore how we can "Keep the Light On" at Alamance Presbyterian Church. That includes both the physical lights in our buildings and the spiritual flame in our hearts.

Each act of generosity — each prayer, hour of service, or financial gift — helps our community better reflect Christ's light into the world.

Your faithful giving is what keeps the light burning strong. Our Youth were clear about how *you* have kept *their* hearts aflame. Our high schoolers celebrated the new youth leadership program through the Log College Project; and the ways that APC has come alongside their families in times of grief or hardship.

They honored and named all the teachers and volunteers who have shown up to guide them, and shared gratitude for how they've been invited to contribute to the church: serving on committees or on Session; leading worship; and ministering to those in need, on mission trips OR with the Food Pantry. They spoke of how the posture of invitation and lack of judgment at this church made them feel safe and seen, and empowered them to work to make others feel that way, too.

This witness, your witness, allows our shared light to reach further than any onE of us could, alone. And so, we ask again that each of you prayerfully consider how you might continue or even increase your commitment to the ongoing work of our ministry. When we each offer what we can, our collective light guides others toward hope, healing, and faith.

Thank you for the ways you already shine with God's love. May your light continue to reflect the grace and goodness of the One who first lit it within you.

The sanctuary's shiny, black, grand pianoforte is off and away, for major repairs to its main structure and for new strings and pins.

This will be a very long process. We are not first in line at Mosaic Piano Services on South Elm Street, for these very specialized repairs! We expect to have the instrument back in its spot on the pulpit platform sometime in February, 2026.

Once those repairs are complete, we will essentially have a new piano, that will serve the church for many years to come.

Until then, we are renting a "loaner" dark brown Steinway and Sons piano; which allows worship leaders to provide music for the congregation's delight and edification. Stay tuned (pun intended) for more piano news, later.

### **Looking Back:**

God has been gracious to provide a time of very focused language work and ministry in the community the last couple of months. Thank you for praying for this time of preparation for the language exam — God has been answering your prayers!

He has provided regular, consistent times with our tutors (something we've learned not to take for granted!) and renewed motivation and energy to help us make the most of these final months of focused Zapotec learning. (We'll continue language learning organically as part of ministry after the exam, but our focus will shift to preparations to begin translation.)

### Now (or Almost Now)

Lord willing, Jesse will take the
Zapotec exam in the next week! This
milestone represents almost four
years of hard work and learning in San
Dionisio. At times, if felt like we'd
never make it here and we'd never
learn this seemingly impossible
language! Even now, Zapotec
continues to surprise us all the time
with the unusual things that happen
in the language with the grammar
and phonology. God has been
faithful! It has not been by our
strength, but by his!

### **Looking Ahead**

Assuming Jesse passes the language exam (we're not too worried!), **we will shift focus** to writing up in-depth linguistic analyses of the grammar and phonology of the language, finalizing a corpus of "texts" that we've analyzed and translated syllable-by syllable,

revising our database of Zapotec vocabulary, revising our literacy materials, and requesting approval of our tentative orthography.

All of these things are requirements in our organization be able to start formally translating Scripture. They not only demonstrate our capabilities in the language, but they also serve the community by creating the start of a body of resources about their language — something they've never had before! (Imagine not even being able to look up a word's definition because there was no dictionary!)

We're also entering a very intense spiritual time around here, due to the traditional practices surrounding Day of the Dead (Nov. 1-2) and also the Christmas holiday. Please join us in praying for this region during this time of darkness but also heightened spiritual awareness.

### November Special Mission Offering: The Shepherd Center of Uganda

Lisa O'Brien Lubulwa, CTEN Missionary, writes: "Thanks so much for advocating for The Shepherd Center for Christmas!

"This year we have 51 boys. As usual, we will have a party for the boys and their parents/guardians, give them gifts of clothing and hygiene items, and bless their families with food packages for the holiday. (The food packages usually include things like rice, corn flour, beans, ground peanuts, and meat.)

"We encourage each boy to spend at least some time over the Christmas holiday with family. Food insecurity is a big factor in why they can't/won't stay at home; so the food packages help — especially with boys who live on-site full time.

"Our current budget is \$76 per boy: for the party (\$10), gifts (\$66), and \$35 for the food packages. A total of \$111 per child equals a total goal of \$5,653." "With that \$66 for gifts, we hope to purchase the following for each child:"

- 1 sweatshirt
- · 2 dress shirts
- 2 t-shirts
- 1 undershirt
- · 2 pairs of pants
- · 2 pairs of shorts
- 2 pairs of underwear
- 1 belt
- · 2 pairs of socks

- 1 pair of shoes
- 1 pair of sandals
- 1 handkerchief
- 2 bars of soap for washing clothes
- -1 container of vaseline
- 1 tube of toothpaste
- 1 toothbrush
- Some "pocket money" (about \$1.50)

By providing basic necessities along with education, group classes, and personalized coaching, we address urgent needs while building long-term stability.

During our 2024-25 fiscal year, we provided 924,922 pounds of food, 945,204 diapers, 237,824 items of clothing, 131,111 hygiene items, 50,961 household goods, 77,834 school supplies, 33,904 toys, 13,947 baby accessories/equipment, 1,608 Comfort BackPacks, and 42,376 books to local children and families via our Community Partners and Family Market. Of course, Jane covers only two of the four required spots. **We still need two volunteers each week**.




